### **How a criminal conviction today can affect your client in family court tomorrow: A review of law and practice in New Hampshire -- Josh Gordon, Emily Wynes and Kysa Crusco**

Emily Wynes is a graduate of University of North Carolina School of Law. After graduating in 2007, she worked as a New Hampshire Superior Court law clerk and Public Defender before entering private practice. Emily defends clients in criminal and family court, with a focus on representing parents in abuse and neglect and termination of parental rights cases in Grafton and Coos Counties.

Joshua Gordon clerked for Justice William Batchelder of the New Hampshire Supreme Court, and was a Public Defender before going into private practice. Joshua focuses primarily on appellate cases. He had participated in dozens of family law and criminal appeals in the First Circuit and the New Hampshire Supreme Court. Eight of them have involved the parenting results of incarceration. ### **Keeping Junk Science Out of the Courtroom -- Radha Natarajan**

Radha Natarajan is the executive director of the New England Innocence Project. After 12 years as a public defender Radha joined the New England Innocence Project bringing her litigation skills, compassion and a fierce determination to bring an end to wrongful convictions. Nationally recognized as an expert in eyewitness identification, Radha applies the lessons learned in the reform of eyewitness identification to other flawed uses of forensic sciences. She provides trainings across the country to the judiciary, the defense bar, prosecutors and law enforcement.

### **A Study in Firearms and Ballistics -- Chris Robinson**

Mr. Chris Robinson has been in the forensic field for over 21 years. He worked at the Georgia Bureau of Investigation for 10 years as an examiner, and he was also the Director of the Atlanta Police Department Crime Lab for 2 1/2 years. He now operates his own company Chris Robinson Forensics and has done so for the last 9 years. He has worked over 9000 cases and has testified nearly 700 times.

### **Strangulation in NH - Dr. Thomas Andrew**

Dr. Thomas Andrew was formerly the Chief Medical Examiner for the State of New Hampshire. He is a graduate of the University of Dayton (1978) and the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine (1982). Dr. Andrew completed a residency in pediatrics at Cincinnati Children's Medical Center in 1985 and served as co-chief resident of pediatrics. He then joined a private practice until 1991 when he returned to the University of Cincinnati for a residency in anatomic pathology. This was followed by a fellowship in forensic pathology with the Office of Chief Medical Examiner in New York City. He is board certified in pediatrics, anatomic pathology and forensic pathology, and has performed over 5,000 autopsies for purposes of investigating sudden, unexpected or violent death. He is a member of the National Association of Medical Examiners, the American Academy of Forensic Sciences, the American Academy
